Camp@Home3 was all about the goats and we gave everyone some reputable sources for Goat Facts – here are a few:

We also invited everyone to come up with some Fake Goat Facts and post them on the Camp@Home Facebook Group



The challenge was to come up with a list of five 'facts' about goats – four of them should be fake facts and one should be a real fat - they could be used to share useful information, they could be believable, they could be ridiculous or outrageous


We invited everyone to work as a team and use the Internet to research goat facts, to come up with their own list and to myth bust the five 'Goat Facts' below:

Here's our list of 'Goat Facts' - can you guess which one is true?

- Only male goats have horns
- The first goat in space was called 'Galina', which NASA incorrectly translated as 'Felicity'
- Goats have no teeth on their upper jaw
- A goat was once nominated as President of the USA as a protest by Midwest Farmers
- A goat's stomach contains three different compartments.

Of course, true or false 'facts' don't just need to be about goats – you could pick any topic and see if you can fool your friends or family by getting them to identify the facts or fiction from a list that you produce.
